The Registered Apprenticeship-College Consortium was launched by Vice President Biden last year at the American Association of Community Colleges and has grown to nearly 200 colleges and more than 900 apprenticeship training centers. This partnership facilitates the application of the Registered Apprenticeship completion certificate towards college credit on a national scale. President Obama has made growing the RACC a priority to put young people and experienced workers on a path towards better jobs, better pay, and an upward career trajectory.

This session will describe will describe how the RACC works and highlight two post-secondary institutions that articulate Registered Apprenticeship completion for college credit.

The Wentworth's external partnership model has demonstrated that it has created a smooth transition for the apprentices and community college graduates to transfer credits into Wentworth's degree programs. This session describes how Wentworth Institute of Technology develops partnerships with trade unions, to design education and training opportunities for their members.

These resources were cited in the recommendations to the President by the Advanced Manufacturing Partnership (AMP) 2.0. INNOVATION & OPPORTUNITY ACT (WIOA) AND APPRENTICESHIP

The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) was signed into law in July, 2014. WIOA is designed to help job seekers access employment, education, training, and support services to succeed in the labor market and to match employers with the skilled workers they need to compete in the global economy. One important tenet of WIOA is to bolster the connection between state workforce agencies and workforce development boards and Registered Apprenticeship. Paulette will provide a brief overview of WIOA and then describe the ways in which apprenticeship can be aligned with the broader public workforce system.
