A key focus will be the potential revival of Industry-Recognized Apprenticeship Programs (IRAPs), initially introduced during Trump's first term and later rescinded by the Biden administration. The presentation will also review expected changes to the treatment of apprentice-able occupations and the apprenticeship utilization requirements under the Inflation Reduction Act, as well as the possibility of increased enforcement actions against registered apprenticeships.

For over 120 years, the Greater Boston IBEW-NECA Joint Apprenticeship and Training Center (JATC) has been the region's leading training provider for the electrical and clean energy industries, having trained more than 18,000 electricians. Committed to fostering a diverse talent pipeline, the JATC actively recruits candidates from varied backgrounds and offers structured pathways into apprenticeships and career-track employment.

Building on this commitment, in 2024, the JATC launched the Clean Energy Pre-Apprenticeship Program (CEPAP) to provide technical training, worksite exposure, and job readiness preparation for 18- to 24-year-olds in Greater Boston. The program's first cohort achieved an impressive 87% completion rate, demonstrating its effectiveness in preparing participants for the Registered Apprenticeship Program and careers in clean energy.

Pathways to Public Service: The Power of Apprenticeships (Panel)

In January 2024, state and local governments were responsible for more than 20 million jobs, or roughly 13 percent of total employment in the US. Public sector employers at every level of government represent critical, and quality jobs, across every community in the US. There is also a growing talent shortage in the public sector and an urgent need to attract, train and retain the next generation of public sector workers. Registered apprenticeship programs can help meet the talent needs of government employers while also investing in the skills and professional development of constituents. Despite hiring needs and growing interest in the apprenticeship model, there are bureaucratic barriers slowing down opportunities to integrate registered apprenticeship programs within government workforce systems.

This session will begin with a presentation from state leaders in Rhode Island, Maine, and Washington D.C., highlighting exciting efforts to scale apprenticeship programs in the public sector and sharing early lessons learned from implementation, before a moderated panel discussion and audience Q&A.

- *The current landscape of registered apprenticeship programs in the public sector*
- *Why stakeholders across the apprenticeship system and public sector employers should care about expanding apprenticeship pathways into public sector jobs*

Registered and Pre-Apprenticeship Behind the Walls Building Futures Inside- Program

Formerly incarcerated individuals face substantial barriers to obtaining family-sustaining employment post release. In recognition of these challenges, Building Futures and the RI Building & Construction Trades Council launched

the Building Futures Inside program in 2023; a pre-release apprenticeship readiness program for individuals incarcerated in Rhode Island's Adult Correctional Institutions. Upon release, graduates enter Building Futures' nationally lauded community-based pre-apprenticeship program, which leads to employment as a registered apprentice in one of many building trade occupations. Return on investment is exceptional and the program currently enjoys 0% recidivism.

Peer support is gaining importance in the workplace due to the increasing recognition that workers often feel more comfortable and supported by talking to colleagues who understand their work experiences. Peer support is a valuable tool for building a resilient workforce. A multilevel organization-wide example through the Laborers' International Union of North America (LIUNA) will be showcased. In addition, a grassroots program that started with a coffee cup and a QR code through the New York State Laborers' Health and Safety Trust Fund will be highlighted.

Strategies to advance quality pre-apprenticeship and increase youth's participation in Registered Apprenticeship

Throughout the country, states are focusing more on pre-apprenticeship programs as an integral part of the Registered Apprenticeship system, particularly as a way to establish pipelines into Registered Apprenticeship Programs (RAPS) and to increase opportunities for underrepresented populations. To increase the number and quality of pre-apprenticeship programs, states are taking strategies such as processes to register pre-apprenticeship programs, partnerships across state agencies, strong employer involvement and connections to RAPS, and enhanced technical assistance for organizations interested in creating pre-apprenticeship programs. This session will share best practices from across the country on strategies to advance pre-apprenticeship programs and increase youth participating in RAPS along with hearing from individuals participating in these programs.
